Once Upon a Time...



PERSONAL, SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- Model different feelings and discuss which behaviour is appropriate within the classroom.
- Begin to understand the feelings of the different characters from stories.
- Taking responsibility of small tasks inside and outside the classroom.
- Team tasks and collaborative activities - The Enormous Turnip.
- Circle Time-speaking and listening activities.

COMMUNICATION & LANGUAGE

- Talk for Writing with the Billy Goats Gruff.
- Listening to and answering questions about different traditional tales.
- Using role-play and small world to re-enact traditional tales.
- Speaking and listening games.
- Learning new vocabulary linked to the season.

LITERACY

- Exploring a range of traditional tales, including *The Gingerbread Man*, *The Billy Goats Gruff* and *The Enormous Turnip*.
- Retelling the stories using masks, props and story maps.
- Meeting the characters from these stories and asking them questions (hot seating).
- Continuing to apply Phase 2 phonics using Ruth Miskin handwriting phrases and introducing new letters and sounds.
- Practicing blending to read words and segmenting to spell words.
- Reading, writing and spelling tricky words, using actions to help the children remember them.

MATHEMATICS

- Recapping and consolidating numbers to 10, using Ten Town resources to help with this
- Measuring and weighing ingredients to follow the recipe to make some *Gingerbread Man*.
- Continue with recognising and using 2D shapes, square, circle, triangle, rhombus, rectangle and talk about their properties.
- Using pennies to count and pay for things in the bakery and within activities in the classroom.
- Beginning to add small groups of objects together.

UNDERSTANDING THE WORLD

- *Gingerbread Man* Science experiment - dipping the *Gingerbread Man* in different liquids.
- Exploring different materials to build bridges for the billy goats gruff.
- Planting bulbs to enhance our outdoor area.
- Explore different cultures and celebrations (including Diwali, Christmas and Bonfire Night).

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

- Using a range of construction materials to make items linked to stories.
- Using large motor skills to move in a range of ways.
- Using a variety of tools and materials safely and with control.
- Developing scissors and fine motor skills with a range of different resources and activities.

EXPRESSIVE ARTS AND DESIGN

- Focusing on the artist Jackson Pollock - Splatter style pictures
- Designing the biggest, ugliest troll.
- Using the ICT suite to develop our computer skills. (2 simple in Purple Mash)
- Music - Christmas songs and Charanga Songs.
- Exploring light and shadows to create our own shadow puppets.

Creative Home Learning

Once Upon a Time...

We shall be mainly focusing on the story of the *Gingerbread Man*, *The Enormous Turnip* and the *Three Billy Goats Gruff*, but feel free to enjoy any of the traditional tales.

Why not cosy up on the sofa and see where your stories take you?

- Make some of your own gingerbread men following a recipe. Plan a design and decorate him. YUM!! Or make some salt dough ones to tell the story with. Make up your own ending.
- Make a cardboard gingerbread man, decorate him and try to retell the story.
- Make your own puppets and act out a traditional tale.
- Use your own toys and teddies to retell the story of the *Gingerbread Man*, or the story of *The Enormous Turnip*.
- Paint and draw your favourite characters, or even try to make a mask. Tell the story to somebody in your family.
- Try making a healthy soup with some turnips or other vegetables, let us know you liked it?
- Go outside and act out the story with family or friends. Video it and share with others.
- Use your own natural materials and make your own *Billy Goat Gruff* tray, add grass and a bridge, you can make your own troll and goats from card or paper.
- Use tightly rolled newspaper to construct your own bridge. What can you balance on the bridge?
- Have a go at making your own firework pictures
- Create your own Diwali art (Mehendi hands or Rangoli patterns)
